


Atomograd. Mapping Slavutych

6 SHORT STUDIES ABOUT LIFE IN THE LAST IDEAL CITY OF THE SOVIET UNION

Slavutych, 186 km north of Kiev, 50 km east of Chernobyl, was built from 1987-89 as a replacement town for the inhabitants of the Prypyat, which had been evacuated after the nuclear catastrophe and has been closed since then. The city can be seen as the last Soviet planned and ideal city.

In the workshop Atomograd. Mapping Slavutych, architecture students from the Lviv Polytechnic National University and

the Vienna University of Technology used drawn cartographies to examine how the lives of the inhabitants are shaped today. The question of the future of a nuclear city has always been in the foreground, whose main employer - to this day the nuclear power plant in Chernobyl - is continuously cutting jobs and thus depriving the city of its livelihood.
